Kathy Smail of Glasswaters Foundation has worked in the past with Dan and Bonny of Clayoquot Action (http://clayoquotaction.org/) which is a grassroots organization looking for support for their projects focused on land and water protection including:

inventory for Clayoquot Sound. They are short the money to publish enough copies to travel to the 3 local First Nations Councils to present the report, as well as to do media work around the report.

- The Wild Salmon Delegation to Norway project: seeking about \$20K additional funding for this project—especially looking for a major gift which they can use to match funds from a crowdsourcing campaign.
- The Big Trees Trail on Meares Island is run by Tla-o-qui-aht First Nations. The boardwalk is in need of repairs, which would probably cost around \$50K.
- Wild Salmon Movement Strategy Workshop: Seeking \$5K.

- 1) **BC Water and Wastewater Association**—recently released report "Are Our Water Systems at Risk! –
 Assessing the Financial Sustainability of BC's Municipal
 Water and Sewer Systems" (http://www.bcwwa. released report "Are Our Water Systems at Risk? -Water and Sewer Systems" (http://www.bcwwa. org/news-4.html). Per David: "Would there be any interest in funding subsequent research to BCWWA on BC municipal water and sewer systems? Or help them engage with local governments/UMBC/etc., on how to finance water and sewer systems?"
- 2) RSBC Rivershed Society of British Columbia (http://www.rivershed.com)—recently applied to REFBC for \$20,000. Excerpt from their application: "Each year, the Sustainable Living Leadership Program takes up to 10 young adults on a journey of a lifetime. Participants travel by raft, canoe, and on foot, the length of the Fraser River from its headwaters in Mt. Robson to the Pacific Ocean. The raft/canoe becomes a floating classroom as participants travel the river, camping along its banks, and experiencing firsthand its fauna and flora, watersheds and ecosystems. Up to three spots reserved for First Nations participants."
- 3) Fort Nelson First Nation—excerpt from FNFN's inquiry to REFBC: "FNFN intends to develop water objectives and management options for water use in FNFN territory that specifically maintains traditional use and treaty rights. These objectives would be used to inform regulation discussions regarding priorities and management of water under BC's newly-created Water Sustainability Act. Items of particular consideration for FNFN are maintaining ecosystem flows, managing cumulative effects, and contributing to compliance and enforcement structures that meet FNFN needs."

4) **WEST** (Water and Environment Student Talks) (June 7-9th)—conference for student researchers, put on by students http://www.west-conference.ubc.ca REFBC is unable to sponsor this, but others from the group may be interested.

5) Wildsight/Living Lakes Canada—Citizen Science Series (Budget: Year 1 \$213,000; Year 2 \$180,000; Year 3 \$177,000)

Overview: Wildsight is seeking funding support for their Living Lakes Canada Citizen Science Series. The program engages communities in assessing lake, river, wetland, and aquifer health, by training and empowering citizens and community groups to monitor water quality and quantity, and collect data for policy implementation. The longer term



goal is to facilitate support and provide a basis for more holistic watershed- based management, which could be undertaken through a number of governance or collaborative structures. Their approach has been developed through the successful delivery of pilot projects within the Columbia Basin. They plan to strengthen and expand that program within the Columbia Basin, and to other areas, including:

- 1) develop new monitoring programs for assessing blue-green algae occurrence, groundwater availability, shale gas impacts, wetland health and glacial change;
- 2) implement protocols in the Columbia Basin and additional watersheds in British Columbia;
- 3) incorporate methods for understanding climate change impacts to implement adaptation opportunities;
- 4) work with partners to exchange info about database management systems;
- 5) apply the knowledge to advocate for holistic watershed based management approaches.

Geographic Scope:

Year 1—Columbia Basin, plus initial geographic expansion is planned for Smithers, Victoria, and Pemberton (with BC Lake Stewardship Society), and in Fort Nelson (with Keepers of the Water).

Years 2 and 3—Additional communities will be added to coincide with the delivery of BC Lake Stewardship Society's Lake Keepers program, and the level of shale gas extraction activity. They will also continue to work with partners such as Skeena Watershed Conservation Coalition and examine potential for additional collaborations with groups such as Nechako Environment and Water Stewardship Society.

Working Group Activities

Keeping Water on the Agenda: Communications Engagement Strategy

With support from the BC Water Funders Collaborative Quick Response Fund, the Canadian Freshwater Alliance has been busy undertaking Phase I of the Keeping Water on the Agenda strategy. They have been making progress developing a BC Freshwater narrative and tool kit that can apply at a regional scale. They have circulated a survey to grassroots organizations across the province to explore interest in being part of this initiative and to help them identify key regional groups with which to partner. Freshwater Alliance has also been working to support groups with their media work on the groundwater pricing issue.

2. WSA Implementation Working Group

With funding from the BC Water Funders Collaborative Quick Response Fund, Linda Nowlan, now of West Coast Environmental Law, is taking the lead on pulling together a Statement of Expectations II from a broad coalition of NGOs related to the implementation of the Water Sustainability Act regulations. The first priority in this process is a specific set of expectations around the groundwater regulations. Linda will be presenting more on this at the April 23rd Spring Workshop.

3. Watershed Governance Working Group:

Sustainable Funding: A working group has been formed around sustainable funding for watershed governance. The Real Estate Foundation of BC and the Ministry of Environment are co-hosting an invite-only workshop in late April, early May. The plan is to gather 12-15 leading thinkers with knowledge of different forms of innovative funding including provincial, municipal, social finance and philanthropy. The group has just selected a facilitator, Kirk Stinchcomb, Econics and the goal is to use the workshop to catalyze an ongoing effort and develop an annual plan and budget.

Indigenous Capacity-Building: On March 26, 2015, Kate Cave (CIER) and Julia Ko (FNFC) presented their proposal at a Water Funders Lunch `n Learn Webinar, entitled "Indigenous Capacity Building Around Water: BC Systematic Review Proposal" and explained how it fits within a broader strategy of strengthening indigenous capacity for watershed planning and cogovernance in British Columbia.

Water Leader Updates

Electronic Survey: POLIS Water Sustainability Project Seeking Input on the Future of Watershed Governance in B.C.

POLIS is asking funders if they can take 15 minutes to complete this survey.

It was sent out to over 900 people across British Columbia as part of a larger, practical exploration of the possibilities and opportunities related to Watershed Governance in British Columbia. This larger project builds off The State of the Water Movement (2013) and The Blueprint for Watershed Governance in BC (2014) and is being supported through a grant from the Real Estate Foundation of BC (REFBC).
